# Music development plan summary: Hartismere School

This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

## Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

- Students in years 7-9 receive 100 minutes of music a fortnight. Year 7 students also receive a 50 minute choir lesson once a fortnight.
- Additionally, there is a Q group in years 8 and 9, which means that some of those students who demonstrate a particular aptitude for music receive a further 100-minute lesson a fortnight.
- In year 7, students study a broad curriculum, developing keyboard, guitar, ukulele and singing skills, and exploring listening and composing activities, supported by theory (including reading notations). The year 8 and 9 programmes of study increasingly allow students to focus their performing skills on either keyboard or guitar / ukulele, in order to advance their skills more rapidly. There is also continued emphasis on listening and composing skills, supported by theory. Students who play other instruments outside the classroom are often able to bring them in for use in lesson time.

- At key stage 4, students studying music receive the equivalent of 2 hours and 5 minutes of music a week.
- Across key stage 5, students studying music receive the equivalent of 4 hours and 10 minutes of music a week, plus additional timetabled study and practice time.
- From the start of year 10, students specialise on a particular instrument of their choice (or voice). All students are encouraged to continue to develop keyboard skills (useful in aiding an understanding of harmony, as well as composing).
- Skills are mapped progressively across key stages in our programmes of study.

- Students are also encouraged to take advantage of one-to-one or small group instrumental or vocal tuition (see Part B).
- Students can study for GCSE Music (Eduqas) in years 10 and 11, and A level Music (Eduqas) in years 12 and 13.
- Our music curriculum is informed by:
  - The National Curriculum Programmes of Study for KS3 Music
  - The specifications for Edugas GCSE and A level Music
  - The Ofsted Research Review for Music (2021)
  - The Model Music Curriculum: Key Stages 1-3 (2021)

#### Part B: Extra-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

- Students are encouraged to take advantage of one-to-one or small group instrumental or vocal tuition with our team of 11 visiting teachers. Our teachers are a mixture of Suffolk Music Hub, Wharf Music Education (Norwich) and private staff. As of September 2024, over 200 students (19% of the student body) were taking instrumental or vocal lessons in school.
- Instrumental / vocal lessons are heavily subsidised for all, and currently cost £6
  per 20-minute lesson. Some students receive free lessons, or lessons at
  reduced cost (see the the Charging and Remissions policy at

- Lessons are offered in: piano, flute, saxophone, clarinet, trumpet / cornet, tenor horn, baritone, trombone, euphonium, tuba, violin, cello, classical guitar, rock / pop guitar, drum kit and singing.
- Students can hire some instruments from school, and others are available from the Suffolk Music Hub (both at low cost).
- Students have the opportunity to take instrumental / vocal graded music examinations. Some students reach Grade VIII: the highest of the standard music grades.
- We offer a timetable of extra-curricular musical activities which varies from term to term but typically includes: concert band, junior band, senior choir (years 9-13 plus staff), junior choir (years 7-8), brass band, string group, flute choir, djembe drumming, acoustic guitar club, singing and band rehearsals for our annual school musical (years 7-13), and support sessions for GCSE and A level composers.
- Extra-curricular rehearsals take place at lunchtime, after school, and during morning registration. Some school production rehearsals also take place during weekends.
- Students are invited to join the concert band when they reach an appropriate standard (Grade III+). Other ensembles are open to all those in the appropriate year groups. All are free of charge.
- Many students use available music classrooms and practice rooms for self-directed individual and group practice at break and lunch times, as well as after school.

# **Part C: Musical events**

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

- We organise a range of annual concerts and shows which students can perform in or watch, including:
  - Three Music Evenings in October, featuring all school ensembles, as well as performances from individual students and bands across all year groups.
  - A Carol Concert in December, featuring all school ensembles, as well as performances from some of our senior musicians.
  - An annual school musical in March, in collaboration with the drama and dance departments, and including a student band. Last year's school production was Sister Act and involved 155 students from all year groups.

- A Summer Arts Evening in July, in collaboration with the drama and dance departments, and featuring students from all year groups.
- Other annual performance opportunities include:
  - Performance of the Last Post / Reveille to mark Remembrance Day.
  - Celebration at Snape Maltings (last year's performance involved concert band and a year 12 jazz ensemble).
  - Key Stage 3 soloists at the Key Stage 3 Celebrations and performances of items from the school production at the Key Stage 4 Awards Evening.
  - Student performances at the Year 6 Transition Evening and Year 5 Open Afternoons.
  - Brass ensemble performance of the National Anthem at the Sports Days.
- We also arrange musical workshops, which vary from year to year. Last year's workshops included:
  - A west African drumming day, led by Wooden Roots and involving key stage 3 students who attend the djembe drumming club plus A level musicians.
  - A songwriting / music industry taster day, led by Industry Education Music and open to year 8 and 9 students.
- All students benefit from an annual opportunity to watch a live musical, organised by the drama department.
- Students represent the school in county-wide ensembles run by the Suffolk Music Hub. This year there are 4 students in the Suffolk Youth Orchestra, 4 in the Suffolk Youth Wind Band, and one in the Suffolk Young Strings.
- Three students are members of the highly prestigious Aldeburgh Young Musicians scheme at Snape Maltings.
- It is free for students to participate in in-school performance opportunities. There
  is generally a charge made for workshops and out-of-school activities. Some
  students receive financial support (see the Charging and Remissions policy in
  Part B).

### In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

#### Short-term priorities (2024-2025 academic year)

- To further develop effective music assessment procedures. The focus will be on the year 9 Film Music unit and year 12 mock exams.
- To build students' awareness of their 'learning journey' (ie. how their learning is sequenced, and where there are links to prior and future learning).

 To develop teacher and student understanding of how to use the new studio, and make improvements to departmental storage space, eg. storage for students' instruments.

#### Long-term priorities

- To adapt and adjust our programmes of study to best suit the change to no AS level examination in year 12.
- To make investigations into a European music or performing arts tour.
- To ensure written reports detailing the progress made in all instrumental and vocal lessons.
